



MEDIA RELEASE: Join us at the Inland Rail 2018 Conference in Parkes

The Australasian Railway Association (ARA) and the Australian Logistics Council (ALC) invite you to save **18 & 19 July 2018** in your diaries for the 2018 Inland Rail Conference in Parkes NSW.

Inland Rail is a nationally significant transport initiative. It will provide a strategic opportunity to make a significant change in the capacity and capability of the national freight rail system.

"2018 is a year of delivery for Inland Rail with construction due to commence on the Parkes to Narromine section of the track, making this inaugural industry-led conference a must-attend event," said **Michael Kilgariff**, Managing Director, Australian Logistics Council.

"The two-day Conference will bring together key players involved in the Inland Rail project to discuss how this nationally significant infrastructure project will transform the movement of freight in Australia, what it means for the Australian freight and logistics industry and the benefits it will deliver for national freight customers," said **Danny Broad**, Chief Executive Officer, Australasian Railway Association.

"Inland Rail will provide a resilient rail network with multiple pathways, that will carry the longer more efficient trains of the future and bring further prosperity to regional Australia," **John Fullerton**, Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer, Australasian Rail Track Corporation.

The Inland Rail project will:

- For the first time provide double-stacked, 1800m trains that will operate across all mainland states.
- Carry 67% of the inter-capital freight.
- Reduce the transit time between Melbourne and Brisbane to under 24 hours from up to 32 hours, making it competitive to road.
- Create freight precincts that will assist in handling freight loading between road and rail and provide a hub
 for distribution, enabling the efficient movement of freight.
- Increase the customer rail market share from 25% to 60% between Melbourne and Brisbane.
- Reduce the cost of Melbourne Brisbane freight to 2/3 of the road transport costs.
- Increase GDP by \$16 billion during the construction and the first 50 years of operation; and
- Create 16,000 new jobs at the peak of construction and another 700 every year for the life of the project.

With work expected to commence this year on the Inland Rail line, the development of the National Freight and Supply Chain Strategy takes on added importance. To maximise the project's effectiveness, we must also address the other impediments to freight efficiency by investing in complementary freight infrastructure, overcoming regulatory barriers and taking a national approach to key freight issues.

For example, we must ensure there are efficient connections to the Port of Brisbane, the Port of Melbourne and to NSW ports including Port Botany, Port Kembla and the Port of Newcastle.

We must also ensure that there is a consistent national approach to planning in our cities and that the Commonwealth Government continues work reforming road pricing for heavy and light vehicles by selecting an independent price regulator.

Embedding Inland Rail in the National Freight and Supply Chain Strategy will provide a building block for future infrastructure investments that will improve freight efficiency for generations to come.
