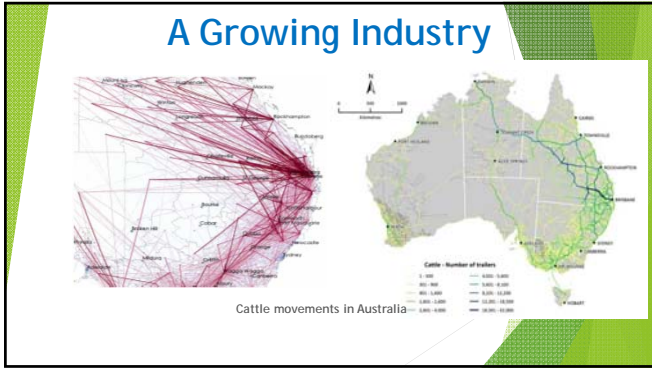


1. Improve NVD for cattle, goat, sheep & lambs
